Iolo Williams, presenter of the BBC 's nature programmes Springwatch, Autumnwatch and Winterwatch, held a packed hall 'enraptored' with an expertly delivered very informative and entertaining talk on Birds of Prey.

Born and brought up in Mid Wales Iolo worked for the RSPB for almost 15 years, as Species Officer for Wales, where his work with some of the country's rarest breeding birds brought him to the attention of the media and the BBC.

As President of the Welsh Ornithological Society the naturalist and writer is passionate about conservation and spoke from over 30 years of personal knowledge and experience, ranging from the sometimes dramatically aerobatic breeding behavior of some species to the devastating impact of pesticides and the continuing llegal killing of these magnificent birds.

Recalling working with a variety of agencies and sometimes colourful individuals, his stories of the assistance sometimes given by off duty special forces personnel and others led to gales of laughter from a very appreciative audience.

The event was organised by Steven Hewitt Vice Chairman of Houghton Village Hall Committee, to raise funds in support of the hall. SAUSAGE AND BEAN HOT POT

This is a really hearty and economical supper dish that easily serves 3 to 4 people. You will need a large frying pan or wok for frying and then a large casserole dish with a lid for oven cooking.

INGREDIENTS

- 500g of good quality pork sausages
- 1tbsp oil for frying
- 1 large onion
- 2 carrots
- 1 400g can of chopped tomatoes
- 1 400g can of chickpeas (drained weight 240g)
- 1 400g can of red kidney beans (drained weight 240g)
- 1 tsp Tabasco
- 2 level tbsp tomato purée
- 1 level tbsp cornflour
- 350ml chicken stock
- Salt and pepper

METHOD

- Gently fry the sausages in the oil over a medium heat. Keep turning them until they are nicely brown all over then put them in an oven proof casserole dish.
- Peel and chop the onions and carrots and in the same frying pan fry them until the onion is soft and transparent - use a little extra oil if you need to.
- Put the vegetables in the casserole dish with the sausages.
- Add the chopped tomatoes and the drained and rinsed chickpeas and kidney beans.
- Finally blend the cornflour with a little of the stock and then add to the dish with the rest if the stock and stir in the Tabasco and purée.
- Give everything a good mix.
- Put the lid on and cook on the middle shelf of the oven at 170c, gas mark 4 for 1 ½ hours.
- Adjust the seasoning before serving.
- Serve with creamy mashed potatoes.

ADVICE FOR DOG OWNERS

DO YOU WALK WITH YOUR DOG OFF THE LEAD? Many dog owners like to let their furry friends run free when out on their daily walks, and this doesn't usually raise any issues.



However, the police are getting frequent calls for service with regards to dogs being "out of control" OR where a dog has been off the lead and an incident has happened, OR the dog has escaped from the home/garden without the owner knowing and caused issues within the community.

Some examples of these incidents are:-

- 1) Dog has been in the park and off the lead (not under proper control in a public place), approached another dog (as dogs do), and has bitten the other dog.
- 2) Dog has been found in a field with livestock after escaping from the garden, owner has called the dogs back and they didn't physically attack the livestock, however stress was caused.
- 3) Dog has been walked down a quiet country lane off the lead, and has accessed a farming pen containing pregnant sheep. Sheep have become stressed and clustered into a corner, and as a result have suffocated.

Where there are offences, these will be dealt with – but also, alongside this, if your dog is involved with an incident similar to this, then a referral will now be submitted.

This will involve putting the details of the dog and owner onto a database, which is shared with the environmental enforcement officer as well as the police. This will then generate a warning letter. Should this same dog or another one owned by the person named on the database, be identified as being involved in further incidents then further action could be taken against you and your dog.

TO AVOID THIS HAPPENING -

- 1) Ensure that your dog is under proper control and on a lead in a public place.
- 2) Ensure a lead is used when walking your dog through fields containing livestock as farmers are well within their rights to shoot any dog not under proper control.
- 3) Ensure that your garden is secure, and that you regularly check on your dog.
- 4) DON'T rely on recall, as this is not classed as proper control.

Penalty

If your dog acts in such a manner mentioned above then you could be taken to court and issued a fine up to £2500 with many conditions placed on your ownership of a dog. The dog could also be forfeited by the courts.

GOD AND GARDENING

For most of my life since then I've disdainfully thought of gardening as the domain of the recently retired – a hobby for those without the energy for anything more thrilling!

I'm more enlightened now. I've become familiar with hellebores and alliums, gained an interest in the various types of compost, and sacrificed my windowsills to seed trays. It's massively satisfying and thoroughly surprising to me. I would never have guessed you'd find me pleased by how well my magnolia tree was doing or worried that my alpines were planted in too boggy a spot. But, now that I've made my garden, I can't help caring about it.

To care about what we've made is a fairly normal emotion, and for a lot of people it's also what seems to be missing in Christianity. The Bible claims that God 'has compassion on all that he has made', but our world doesn't always look like it's being cared for by a God who loves it.

Christians don't claim to have all the answers to the suffering in our world, but we are convinced that God cares for us. Why? Simply because of what we think of Jesus. He is God himself, who came into the world as a human so he could give his life to save us. That is not the act of an uncaring God but an infinitely loving one. Jesus is the ultimate evidence that God has compassion on all that he has made. The man who two thousand years ago died and then came back to life didn't just make us but also cares about us.

Parents also explained their roles in industry, including: food design, 3D moulds and Easter Egg manufacture, aluminium can production and global mining and the equipment needed. A free event, watch sheep shearing, go on a guided farm walk, see the Wildlife Trusts new community garden, several environmental and organic displays to enjoy, hopefully Tawny will still be in residence.

Lambing has just finished and in spite of a very wet and windy first week, we have a good crop of healthy lambs, those of you who walk the footpath to Tarraby wood will have seen the lambs gambolling in the little field beside the wood. Many people enjoyed the hot summer last year however for us farmers it presented a challenge as our yield of hay was down by a third. We have been fortunate that this winter was mild and the grass began to grow in February but now we have snow in April. We are hoping we will have enough forage to see us through this cold spell.

Ruth - our education officer – was extremely busy during lambing with at least 2 school visits every day. It was great that the PTA of Houghton C of E primary school enabled every class to visit the farm during lambing.

Those walking the footpath through the water meadows will see that there are a few cattle grazing there earlier than usual, there is grass there and we hope they will knock back the soft rush which at this time of year is palatable for them and the tips of the rush are 16% protein.

Calving will be very slow this year, we are expecting mast of the calves in July and August, Jeremiah and his "ladies "did not enjoy the very hot weather lat summer . We will be bringing the cows back to Houghton for calving.

Those who call at the farm to purchase produce will see that we have created a new "Sales " area,, we are delighted with it and hope all our visitors will be as well.

Stanwix Rural Parish Council HEADLINES

PASRISH COUNCIL CHANGES

Due to their moving out of the parish area Cllrs. Mike Fox and Robert Gordon were unable to seek re-election in May. Both have made invaluable contributions to the council throughout the last 11 years, Mike Fox also serving periods as both Chairman and Vice-Chairman. Houghton Ward Cllr. Colin Duncan is also no longer with the council; his contribution to Houghton in Bloom and the Love Your Garden Competition being highly regarded. On behalf of the community their Parish Council colleagues take this opportunity to offer their deepest gratitude for all they have done and wish them well!

PRECEPT

Due to the loss of the Council Tax Reduction Scheme Grant, reductions in other funding streams and rising costs; the council has been forced to increase the precept in order to sustain and increase the council's work. This is only the second increase since 2010, both occasions arising within the last two years.

BOUNDARY CHANGES

Following a Boundary Commission review (which reduced the number of City Council Wards to 13 represented by 39 Councillors), perhaps the most significant single change to affect the parish is that the old Electoral Ward of Stanwix Rural is now supplanted by a new 'Stanwix and Houghton Ward'. Although Stanwix Rural Parish Council area remains part of the new ward the ward its self is designated as Urban, rather than Rural.

The new ward in which we live now includes a large part of urban Stanwix and extends from Crosby on Eden and Wall Head in the east, to the north bank of the River Eden between Austin Friars and Eden Bridge, in the west. This arrangement is very similar to Carlisle District in that it has a high population urban area, with an extended low population rural hinterland.

Carlisle's new warding arrangements lead, in May, to our former long serving City Councillors Clirs. Marilyn Bowman and James Bainbridge moving to other wards and new ones being elected here. On behalf of the community the Parish Council wishes to thank Marilyn and James for their much appreciated time, effort and support over the years.

The parish is now represented on the City Council by Cllrs. Elizabeth Mallinson, Paul Nedved and Fiona Robson, who all formerly represented the old Stanwix Urban Ward. As a result of the changes City Council elections will now take place every year.

THE SUMMER PLAY SCHEMES

These Play Schemes in Houghton and Crosby are always well attended and it is anticipated that this year's programme will also be well used. Without on-going funding from the Parish Council it is unlikely that the Play Days would be continued.

PARISH COUNCIL'S COMMUNITY GRANT SCHEME

This scheme attracts applications from a range of community groups and organisations and fortunately the council is usually able to meet, to a large degree, the majority of requests for financial assistance.

CROSBY FLOOD GROUP

The Council continues to support this group in its discussions with the Environment Agency and others, as it seeks to secure better defensive measures and resilience support for the communities of Crosby and Rickerby. Progress in these matters has always been frustratingly slow and it is hoped that a start date may now be calculated in months rather than years.

BRUNSTOCK COMMON LAND

Brunstock Common Land has seen improvement work to the pond area taking place. This is an on-going process, the council and residents working together to provide an interesting and attractive community space. Works will continue as weather and seasons allow.

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Hedgehog Havens Needed Across Cumbria

Sadly, in the past decade alone we have lost over a half of our rural hedgehogs and a third from our towns and cities across the UK. Solid garden boundaries, tidier gardens and the intensification of agriculture are all to blame for this alarming decline. But there are ways in which you can help.

You can make your garden or back yard more hedgehog-friendly:

- Create a hedgehog highway cut a CD case-sized hole in your fence to enable hedgehogs to roam between yours and your neighbours gardens and yards
- Avoid using pesticides hedgehogs are natural pest controllers
- Provide nesting sites logs, piles of leaves and wilderness areas make great places for hedgehogs to nest and hibernate
- Let your grass grow a little wild it's an important home for hedgehog prey
- Set up a feeding station with hedgehog food or meaty pet food and clean water

Cumbria Wildlife Trust has been tracking the location of hedgehogs across the county for the last three years, via their survey website http://hedgehogs.cumbriawildlifetrust.org.uk

Charlotte Rowley from Cumbria Wildlife Trust says:

"Our iSpy a Hedgehog survey website has been hugely popular with Cumbrians. 1,897 sightings have been submitted over the last three years On average, 80% of the sightings have been of a live hedgehog which is wonderful to know."

Carlisle Youngsters Win Wildlife Awards

Three young people from Carlisle were recently presented with John Muir Awards in recognition of their hard work towards helping nature and wildlife.

Chris Greensmith, Ellis Fleming and Connor Tyson received the environmental awards after taking part in a project run by Carlisle Youth Zone (CYZ) and Cumbria Wildlife Trust, during which 29 young people gave hands-on help to restore and nurture wildlife in some of Cumbria's wild places.

To earn their awards, they helped to improve the woodlands at Wreay Woods Nature Reserve near Carlisle by helping to repair a bridge that had been damaged in the floods of 2015 and rebuilding entrance steps and a hand rail. They also helped to restore the damaged boardwalk in the wetlands at Gosling Sike, Cumbria Wildlife Trust's northern base in Houghton, and worked on the creation of the new community wildlife garden at Gosling Sike.
